Greater Victoria is unique in B.C. with 13 large, medium and tiny municipalities interacting every day. The Capital Integrated Services and Governance Initiative report is a matter of public record. Policing structures form only one chapter in a detailed and sad litany. The cumulative effect is to raise costs while putting public safety at considerable risk and weakening our shared economy.

What will it take for the province to step in, another sewer project impasse or a more serious governance failure lurking in our collective futures?
